First we had a game of conversation starters to get to know some of each other. We were to identify ourselves, our country and some of our likes. Each of us had a different question to ask of other people. Three people were secretly designated to identify the first, second, or third person spoken to, to which were given prizes later.

After getting our dinners we scattered to several parts of the rooms for eating and further conversations.

After dinner the home owners talked about the history of their home. Eventually Terry explained the real meaning of Christmas: The Creator of the Universe temporarily became a human being, born of a virgin woman. That birth is celebrated as Christmas, though the actual year of the birth is not accurately known other than within a couple of years. The birth was likely at a different season. December 25 was arbitrarily chosen in the early fourth century. But the importance does not stop there in the birth of a baby. That person grew up as Jesus. After about three years of teaching ministry and miracles, Jesus was arrested as planned, tried, condemned to a cruel death on the cross, and died to pay the penalty we all owe to God for our disobedience to God. It is in the Springtime, near the

For the third game there were three teams. A decoratively wrapped box was placed in the center of each team. Each person rolled two dice. Then those two persons had to open the box using only their gloved hands. Meanwhile other team members kept rolling the dice.
